


Thunder clapped its approval for the floral designs and the flood of horticultural specimens that were on display for the show. Flowers reigned in the Berkshires.



The Food Project manages 68 acres of suburban farm land and more than 3 acres of urban agriculture plots. These plots are made up of historic conservation land owned and managed by The Trustee of Reservations. Additionally, delinguent land has been preserved through a partnership with the city of Boston as well as neglected north shore residential properties which have been conserved through planting produce gardens. This Exhibit will illustrate how The Food Project conserves land as well as educates students and the community.



Never under estimate the items in your local grocery store. The aisles are filled with interesting items...only limited by one's own imagination. I don't like to use processed food items like pastas and ground spices, but consider all the great dried beans and seeds they have there....and that's just in the dry goods areas.

Walk on over to the Produce Department. Look at the colors, textures and patterns that the fruits and veggies offer. Seasonal offerings are the best. The look is so interesting. Imagine using radishes...removed the greens and skewer the root into your floral design with the root tips exposed. Best when used in multiples as a block of color and texture. Kale and so many other greens, peppers, squash and carrots too. The possibilities are endless. Winter Squash, pumpkins and gourds, cabbage...and on and on.

These days, supermarkets offer many choices in their Floral Departments too. Yes, there a lot of mixed bouquets; but, often times you can find bunches of a single type of flowers. This is my personal favorite when shopping at the grocery store.

Choose a combination of cut flowers and vegetable produce to make your creations. The flowers are always beautiful but the veggies will add interest and some a bit of whimsy.

During my recent trip to the grocery market, I picked up three leaves of Aloe vera, a bunch or Orange Lilies (3 stems), 2 bunches of the Green Trick Carnations (12 stems), 1 bunch of green Fuji Mums (6 stems), 1 bunch rusty colored Mums (6 stems) and a Horned Melon (Cucumis metuliferus).

Over the course of creating these design... some materials were used and reused. The leaves of the Aloe vera are extremely long lasting. They are still holding up after four weeks and I suspect they will continue onward for many more weeks. This is a good plant material to use in design when no water source will be used.

I chose some contemporary containers in black and white. Beaded green Midellino was used along with floral foam, mono filament string, florist wire and skewers were used throughout the design. Skewers were inserted into the Aloe vera to secure it into the floral foam. Clear mono-filament string (fishing line) was used to suspend the Horned Melon off of the tips of the Aloe.

The Green Trick Carnations were cut short and inserted into the floral foam to resemble grass. These too are long lasting flowers but do need a water source.

During this Fall season the supermarket has some great seasonal offerings: Mini pumpkins in orange and white Gourds

Peppers (contorted and colorful)

Add this to all the nuts and berries, seed pods, colorful autumn foliage and interesting moss covered branches gathered from the wild. Fungi and wild mushrooms can add much interest too. Remember, if you don't like to pick wild mushrooms...your supermarket has many varieties to choose from for all your Supermarket Chic designs this season.







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

No carving required...

This orange pumpkin began with a piece of wet floral foam attached to the top by the stem. Green string beans, mushrooms, artichokes, red and green peppers, moss and yellow gerbera daisies finish the design for this clinging, hairy, black spider.

For this frightening FALL pumpkin for Halloween...Go to the Fall 2013 edition of Flower Show Flowers for hints and instructions. Pick a pumpkin, gather some interesting vegetables and flowers and make your goblin or ghost. Here, a white pumpkin is decorated with yarn in a cobweb pattern and green peppers, mushrooms, string beans, chrysanthemums and aspidistra leaves were added and then topped with a hairy spider.



By the Light of the Silvery Moon White Gourds on a bed of white Rice with a Lichen covered branch, dried Magnolia leaves and dried Hosta leaves and Lotus pods.







MATERIALS

- Slim Dowels (approx, 24") 30
 - Spool of paper covered Bind Wire
 - Spray Paint for wooden dowels

TOOLS

Metal Clippers or Utility Scissors to cut the Bind Wire

PLANT MATERIALS

- **Dried Hosta Leaves** Dried Magnolia Leaves
- 2 Echerveria
- Air Plants Tillandsia 2 Pokeberries Wild Cucumber Vine Autumn Leaves



To begin (A), take two lengths of bind wire and wrap a dowel over and under. Add a second, third and so forth continuing with the same process. Keep the tension uniform and tight. Complete all the dowels and repeat the process with a second set of pieces of the bind wire. Make any adjustments with the finished rows and bring the twisted lines to about 1/2" of each other.

Spray paint to the desired color at this point or leave natural.

Now the fun; see (B). Twist and turn the pieces to a swirl pattern of your liking. The dowels will support itself and stand up if the bind wire was applied in a uniform tight manner.


Dried flowers and long lasting plant material can be added at this point. Use water tubes for all other plant materials. The dowel sculpture can also be attached to a structure for more stability. Consider multiple dowel twists for added interest.



S-T-R-E-T-C-H

A STRETCH FLORAL DESIGN is comprised of two units of unequal size that are joined by a prominent stretch component. The smaller unit should appear to be pulled away from the larger unit. Tension between the two objects is essential.

This year's show will feature hundreds of chrysanthemums, ornamental peppers, and ornamental grasses that will fill the Sunken Garden with a stunning array of red, orange, yellow, gold, green, bronze, and maroon. The tradition of the annual Fall Flower Show began in 1915 when the Marjorie McNeely Conservatory first opened. Today, the Conservatory hosts five season annual flower shows. Marjorie McNeely Conservatory, 1225 Estabrook Dr, St Paul, MN 55103 is open daily October 6 through November 25 from 10:00am-4:00pm. There will be a show change October 29 - November 2 during which the Sunken Garden will be closed, but all other rooms of the Conservatory will remain open to the public.

Phipps Conservatory Mum Show 1 Schenley Drive, Pittsburgh, PA 15213 See a seasonal favorite in a brilliant new light. Starting Oct. 17, this year's Fall Flower Show brings a new perspective to the season's famed chrysanthemums through the lens of Japanese horticulture. Join us for a spirited introduction to Kiku-no-hana, or Kiku, the Japanese name for chrysanthemum, as we showcase the unique ways the blooms are traditionally grown in Japan and their importance in Japanese culture.

The wonder begins in the Palm Court, which represents China, the chrysanthemum's country of origin and the inspiration for the Japanese tradition, with vibrant plants in shades of red and orange, massive origami cranes, metal ornate lanterns and flickering candles. The Serpentine Room winds through a gradation of white, yellow, golden yellow, orange and deep red mums, while the Sunken Garden overflows with cascade towers of chrysanthemums and undulating waves of wagasas, or Japanese umbrellas. More beauty awaits in the Victoria Room, where the Japanese royal crest floats in the tranquil pond, and the East Room, where orange and coral blooms surround an ornate bridge and lanterns.
